Letter from the Executive Director

As I reflect on the changes of 2022, I am immeasurably proud to report that, despite the continued challenges faced by our staff, clients and the non-profit sector as whole, Hands Across The Water has continued to make significant strides in our mission to empower and support children and families through inclusive, strengths-based services in our community.

In 2022, Hands Across The Water experienced, like many industries, significant turnover of staff across all programs and levels of the agency. Retirements, relocations, babies, higher education pursuits, and new opportunities for our highly skilled staff converged to leave those staff who remained to pull together in ways beyond our typical culture of collaboration. We raised salaries and mileage reimbursement as inflation skyrocketed and pinched our hardworking staff, just at a time when agency costs increased and our revenue dropped. We welcomed new faces and new perspectives to our board of directors. We kept putting one foot in front of the other, continued to push forward with innovative programming and funding proposals, and one by one filled our positions with excellent candidates, dedicated to our crucial mission and vision. The families' needs didn't stop, so neither did we.

At the same time, 2022 marked a year of renewed commitment to caring for ourselves in service to others, encouraging each other to take breaks and seek help when things were overwhelming. Veteran staff were grateful to continue to use remote work/hybrid work schedules, when possible, to complete their work in the most efficient ways. We learned the lesson again in 2022 that we can't be present for those who need us if we are depleted ourselves. It is the perseverance and determination of our people that kept us moving forward in 2022.

As we look to the future, our agency remains committed to our mission of providing safety and support to vulnerable children and families in our community through inclusive, strengths-based services. We are excited to continue our work and make an even greater impact in the year to come with renewed energy and optimism.

Thank you for your continued support of the vital work that we do at Hands Across The Water.



CHANGES TO OUR BOARD AND STAFF









2022 was a year of shifts to our board and staff that was unlike any we've ever had and is unlikely to happen again in quite the same way!

At the end of the first quarter of the year, and just prior to our learning that we had been reaccredited to continue providing international adoption services (more about that on page 10), a vacancy opened on our international team. Given the number of agencies that have stopped providing these services, HATW had a challenge recruiting candidates with the correct experience. At that time, our longtime board president, Melissa Daneshyar (pictured above top left), expressed her desire to step down from her service and reenter the workforce. Melissa worked for Hands Across The Water years ago, then stepped back from the workforce and joined the board while raising her children. While it took some additional steps to make this transition happen, HATW was thrilled to have Melissa step into the role of International Adoption Specialist. Her experience in this space not only as a social worker but as an adult adoptee is invaluable.

In June of 2022, HATW's longest-serving employee Julie Roesch (second from left) retired after 22 years of service, first as a social worker handling international adoptions, and at the end of her employment as the supervisor of the Behavioral Health department. Julie has an encyclopedic knowledge of HATW's growth over the years and was well-known and beloved to many of our clients. Spoiler alert for 2023: Julie returned to serve HATW as a member of the board.



HATW remains Hague-accredited

In late April of 2022, we learned that a year's worth of effort by our team to meet federal accreditation standards to continue providing international adoption services had been successfully met, and that our legacy of excellence in international adoption services would continue. While the number of agencies that continue to work in international adoption dwindles each year, HATW feels a strong conviction that there is a need for children and families to have a strong ethical advocate in their corner, and that our work is meeting a real need.





Virtual 5K returns

Our second virtual 5K fundraiser was boosted by a donor who matched up to \$5K worth of donations. With that generous match and help from sponsors like Blue Cross Complete, Walton Insurance, Altruic Advisors and Level One Bank, the event raised more than \$12,000 to pay for things like for music and art lessons, sports fees and camp fees for young people in foster care.

Back to School

HATW once again supported the efforts of the consortium of Washtenaw County agencies working to put together a Back to School event for young people in care, in partnership with the Michigan Foster Closet. In the pandemic era this event has continued to be a drive-up/drive-through gathering that supplies youth with not only a backpack full of supplies but new outfits and shoes to send them into the new academic year well-equipped and in style.





Cocktails for a Cause

Friend of HATW Holly Rider welcomed us to her beautiful home in Dexter in September, where the weather allowed us to greet old friends and new outdoors in the garden, gathering in person to reflect on how meaningful face-to-face connection can be. Many attendees were not aware of HATW's work, or some only with certain programs, and it was wonderful to come together and share meaningful discussions about child welfare and its impact on our communities.

Bigger than the Game Rematch

During National Adoption Awareness Month in November, HATW faced off against Columbus-based Caring for Kids once again to see who could sell more raffle tickets to benefit foster youth served by our agencies with the big prize of a pair of tickets to the UM/OSU game. HATW worked hard for victory, but Caring for Kids rallied in the final hours of the final day to outsell Michigan, causing HATW staff to pay off its bet with a ground photo showing our support for OSU.
